Originally from Fairview in Sanpete County, Dr. Carlston graduated from North Sanpete High School. He then graduated from Snow College with an associate degree and from Utah State University with bachelors and masters of education degrees. He earned a doctorate in Educational Administration at Brigham Young University. Dr. Carlston worked in the Center for Improvement of Teacher Education at Brigham Young University. In addition to that role, Carlston has been a junior high school teacher, a school principal, district curriculum director, and was superintendent of the Logan City School District. Carlston was a tenured faculty member at Utah State University, associate dean in the College of Education, and interim department head of secondary education at USU. He has also been deputy state superintendent and served as Governor Mike Leavitt's Deputy for Education.
